

Kesselman, Amy V. (1944 –) Historian and women's studies teacher, Kesselman participated in the caucus at the National Conference for New Politics that generated the West Side Group (Chicago), an early women's liberation group. Kesselman was also a founding member of CWLU and taught a high-school class in women's studies in Chicago in 1968. As a West Coast organizer for New University Congress (1970), she organized women's studies conferences in California. She also taught in the women's studies program at Portland State University and Mt. Hood Community College.

Kesselman, who has a Ph.D. in history from Cornell, has written widely on feminist issues. She wrote "Our Gang of Four: Friendship and Women's Liberation" with Heather Booth, Vivian Rothstein and Naomi Weisstein, published in *The Feminist Memoir Project* (1998). Other articles include "Women's Liberation and the New Left in New Haven, Connecticut," published in *Radical History Review* (Fall, 2001); "Feminism 1965 to the Present," published in the *Encyclopedia of New England Culture* (Yale University Press); and "Outrageous/Liberating Acts: Putting Feminism Into Practice," with Ann Mussey, published in *Teaching Introduction to Women's Studies: Student Resistance and Classroom Strategies* (Greenwood, 1999). Kesselman is the author of *Fleeting Opportunities: Women Shipyard Workers in Portland and Vancouver During World War II and Reconversion* (SUNY Press, 1990), and co-editor of *Women: Images and Reality*, a multicultural anthology (2002).
