

Mrs. Ollie Butler-Moore Given Nat'l Recognition

Mrs. Ollie Butler-Moore, dean of women, Southern University, has received two national honors. She has been informed of her election for listing in the 1963-64 edition of Who's Who In American Education.

She has already received appointment to serve on the Executive Resolutions Committee of The National Association of Women Deans and Counselors, which organization's membership comprises more than six thousand women educators and guidance counselors in the fifty United States of America. The appointment was made in time for Dean Moore to serve at the recently held annual convention in Portland, Oregon. According to Miss Barbara Catton, executive secretary of NAWDC, Washington D.C. and Miss Helen Schelman, president, and dean of women at Purdue University, the appointment is to "a standing committee of five members and for the next biennium. This is one of the most important committees of the Association which gives serious consideration to important issues in education and in the society."

Issues considered at the 1964 convention were in the areas of (1) Education and Professional Status of Women, (2) Civil Rights Legislation, (3) The Education and Career Planning of Youth, (4) Federal Aid Extension for Professional Preparation in College Student Personnel Work, (5) The NDEA Code of Ethics, (6) Federal Income Tax Deductions for Additional Voluntary Educational Expenses of Student Personnel Workers, (7) Sabbatical Leaves for Student Personnel Workers, (7) Sab-
